2023 Youth Ministry Chaperone Training

All youth ministry activities are chaperoned by adults 21 years of age or older.

 Minimally, the initial ten or fewer participants need to be chaperoned by no fewer than two adults.



All youth ministry activities are chaperoned by adults 21 years of age or older.

• For each additional one to six youth (those younger than 18 years of age), an additional adult needs to be added.



All adult chaperones must...


Complete Diocesan Safe Environment requirements.



Diocesan Safe Environment requirements are...

- Completing Volunteer training.
- Reviewing and signing diocesan Code of Conduct
- Successfully completing a background check.

Requirements must be met <u>prior</u> to serving as a chaperone!





For example, if you were chaperoning at Steubenville or NCYC, group leaders must designate a meeting location so that any teen can find them throughout the day. In addition, teens should have a non-private way to communicate with the group leader (such as a full group chat) to be able to locate you if you are not at the designated location.



Chaperones are expected <u>to...</u>

Attend all required meetings for a particular youth ministry activity so they are familiar and comfortable with the activity they will be overseeing, as well as the tasks for which they will be responsible during the activity.

Chaperones who will be serving on a retreat team, or at an extended event such as a conference require training that is exclusive to that event. Team members are not effective when they have not worked through the material, understand the schedule and contemplated intended or unexpected outcomes with the entire team. Planning and preparation is ESSENTIAL and should be required for participation as a chaperone.


If a youth ministry activity involves young people from several parishes...



each parish represented at the activity minimally <u>needs</u> to provide one chaperone while ensuring that the youth to chaperone ratio for the entire activity is met.

It is neither safe or effective to invite teens to participate in events without an unknown adult present. Please provide a CASE trained chaperone when sending any teen to a diocesan event, conference or neighboring parish function. If a team member is not available, a CASE trained parent will be required to attend. This greatly reduces opportunities for poor behavior and makes it more meaningful to a teen to have a committed adult present with them.

Chaperone Responsibilities



Both leaders and youth need to be informed of the schedule for the day. If there is a chance that a schedule will need flexibility, communicate that clearly with participants. Maintain clear starting and ending times to eliminate issues with drop off and pick up.



Observe young people (those younger than 18 years of age) for unacceptable behavior.

Youth should be held to a Code of Conduct Standard.


- It is unacceptable for youth, at any church event to engage in:
- -Disrespectful or rude behavior with other youth or adults
- -Physical altercations or inappropriate touching
- -Substance use
- -Bullying or harassment
- -Destruction of property
- -Wandering unchaperoned
- -Endangering the safety of oneself or others

We expect youth to come and participate in the spirit of the event and have the opportunity to grow in relationship with Christ and others.

It is recommended that all youth sign a code of conduct and each event begins with a review of expectations and rules.

Be on guard for young people (those younger than 18 years of age) being loud, obnoxious, and/or rude. Do not tolerate this behavior.






When inappropriate behavior occurs,

verbally correct that behavior along with removal from the situation or removal of a device, as appropriate. Immediately notify the youth leader if not present. If the behavior continues, isolate that young person while maintaining safe environment regulations. (2 adults present/public place)



If the call to a parent is ineffective and behavior persists, notify the parent/guardian that immediate pick up is required. If you are out of town, arrangements are to be made at the expense of the family. As a follow up, a conference should take place between the youth leader, pastor, parent and young person. This conference must take place before the young person's participation continues in youth ministry.



Leaders should always have a medical release on file.

Other precautions should include:

-providing ample water breaks for physical activity

-Knowing medical histories or special needs

-having a complete first-aid kit

-Having CPR trained individuals on the team

ALWAYS notify parents and write up a report, should any incident occur



KNOW if your group members are carrying epi pens, insulin kits or any other emergency medical devices




It is NOT ok for young people in your care to travel on excursions independently, even if they are allowed to do so in their daily lives.



Make sure young people (those younger than 18 years of age) are properly dressed at all times.

MODESTY is important, as is discretion. Do not allow clothing that is inappropriate either due to its lack of coverage or language/message.



The standards in the proceeding slides are a reminder of the Adult Code of Conduct. Please review each slide and discuss the implications Chaperones may not be alone with a young person and need to make sure they are in view of others for their safety and the safety of the young people. Any verbal or nonverbal sexual behavior with any young person is inappropriate and prohibited.







Sexual gestures or overtures a young person makes to an adult or another young person should be reported to the parish group leader.



Chaperones may not appear in front of young people (those younger than 18 years of age) unless appropriately clothed. Chaperones may not change clothes in the same room or in view of young people (those younger than 18 years of age).





Chaperones may not use derogatory language when addressing a young person.



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All suspicions of child or sexual abuse need to be reported to the parish group leader.



Chaperones need to ensure young people are well fed and stay hydrated.
