



We ask that if your son or daughter takes daily medicine, that is listed on the health form and is taken under the supervision of his or her group leader.



Pilgrims should also avoid bringing gaming systems for their hotel room, laptops, tablets, and other entertainment devices. In addition to these items being valuable, they can distract pilgrims for immersing themselves in the NCYC experience.

We have used Anderson bus company for many years now with excellent results! Buses are equipped with bathrooms, comfortable seating, ample storage and outlets for charging. It is important to arrive 30 minutes prior to departure to allow time for buses to be loaded and keep your group on schedule! We have a parish group leader on each bus that serves as a bus captain. The bus captains keep in communication with the diocesan staff and serve as a liaison with the bus drivers. Pilgrims should dress comfortably but please no pajamas. A small travel pillow and light blanket are allowed but we do not have room for large items as our buses are quite full. Stops are at the discretion of the driver, so do not plan on food stops. It is appropriate to set aside some money to add to the tip envelope for the driver as it passed.



Members of the diocesan team will be there to greet pilgrims, with room keys in hand, and get them to their rooms swiftly and safely so that they can get right to sleep. Young people are typically quite sleepy at this time, so if you are awaiting a text and don't receive one upon their arrival, it may be due to some sleep brain fog. It is suggested that you track your son or daughter's location so you know when they arrive and can avoid worrying that you didn't receive a text. Groups may want to establish a parent group text, where a group leader can notify all parents at once.


If a young person needs something in their hotel room (extra pillow, blanket, towel, etc.), they should tell a chaperone. Chaperones should be the only individuals contacting hotel staff. The only people that should be in each hotel room should be the people assigned to that room. There are not to be any co-ed gatherings in hotel rooms. This includes a brother and sister who may be visiting one another. This ensures the code of conduct is being followed. A nightly curfew will be established and at that time, all individuals are to be in their assigned rooms. Our diocesan team will patrol halls until a reasonable hour, to ensure safety, proper hotel etiquette with noise, etc., and be present to handle any issues that arise. We work closely with hotel security to oversee the safety of all our participants and members of our team take shifts at the hotel entrances to make sure our delegation is safe and where they are expected to be.

Pilgrims should know the name, location, and telephone number of the hotel. Room doors should be locked at all time and only opened when leaving the room or people known to pilgrims are at the door. Pilgrims should review emergency evacuation procedures for the hotel (usually posted on the back of the door).

As a sign of Christian charity and of our gratitude, we ask that our group tip the hotel housekeeping staff. As a guide, the tip should be \$2.00 per person per day.



If your son or daughter has any dietary needs that will not be met by this daily breakfast, please consult with us on how we can make sure they get the nutrition they require. Please note that coffee is served as part of the buffet and intended for adults. It is important to talk with your teen about caffeine intake and the long days they will be experiencing. Loading their systems with caffeine and then crashing in the afternoon will make it very difficult to sustain the energy required for the pace of the conference!



The conference venues are all within a short walk of our hotel. Participants will be accompanied by adult volunteers whenever leaving the hotel. Because we are in a downtown setting, you may want to converse with your child about what they might experience with regard to city life if they are not familiar with that environment. We advise students to avoid interaction with individuals who might try to engage with them on the streets, to be mindful of their surroundings, and to adhere to sidewalks, traffic lights, and crosswalk usage. A great benefit of our proximity to the Convention will be the ease at which we can travel to and from the events each day, saving ourselves a lot of travel time that used to extend our days when our delegation stayed outside the city. However, it might be tempting for youth to recognize how close they are to the hotel and head back to pick up a forgotten sweatshirt, use the bathroom or take a nap. This is not allowed under any circumstances without the accompaniment of an adult and approval by our Diocesan team and will result in a call home or more extensive discipline.




The Indiana Convention Center is where pilgrims will spend most of their time during NCYC! This is where the breakout sessions take place. It is also the home of the Interactive Exhibit Hall. The breakout sessions will take place in various spaces within the convention center. The interactive exhibit hall will be in halls C-E. A prayer chapel is open for several hours each day in room 133. Reconciliation is available for several hours on Friday and Saturday. Daily Mass will be offered several times each day at St. John the Evangelist. There are also quiet spaces where a young person who is overstimulated by crowds or noise can spend some time resting.



Lucas Oil Stadium is the home of the general keynote sessions on Thursday evening, Friday, and Saturday. It is also where the closing Mass will be on Saturday evening. The staff of the National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry (NFCYM), the organizers of NCYC, work with local authorities to ensure the well-being of all those at NCYC. Our groups will be very safe as they navigate between these conference venues. Again, because we will be in a major city, our groups should be aware that they may encounter people who are homeless or who are suffering in other ways.



Busy Day! WE ASK PILGRIMS WEAR THEIR DIOCESAN T-SHIRT on Thursday as our group identifying gear. They can wear any comfortable clothes they would like to the conference. Pilgrims should wear appropriate outerwear for the weather and shoes for walking. NO FLIP FLOPS OR HEELS and SOCKS are recommended in case there are long security lines in chilly temperatures! As you can see, our delegation will kick off our time together by attending daily Mass at St. John the Evangelist which is in walking distance of our hotel. The diocesan team will be in regular communication with CHAPERONES/GROUP LEADERS. When we reach curfew, please know that members of the diocesan team will be walking the hotel floors where our rooms are to ensure pilgrims are in their rooms and quiet.



Friday will be a very full day for our youth and chaperones. This is why sleep and good nutrition as well as HYDRATION will be essential during the Conference.



Friday pilgrims will experience several large sessions in the stadium with approximately 12,000 people. These sessions include a variety of prayer experiences, sacred music, and inspiring witnesses of faith by national Catholic speakers. The large session in the evening will allow pilgrims to experience the presence of Jesus through Eucharist adoration and the sacrament of confession (if so moved). It is pretty powerful! Pilgrims will also attend smaller breakout sessions that will allow them to interact with others and that will address topics such as discipleship, social justice, being faithful when friends are not, being a leader in the church, and many more. Encourage your child to make the most of these sessions. Lastly, pilgrims will have time to explore the interactive exhibit hall. There, they will have an opportunity to participate in a variety of service projects, interact with ministries/religious communities from across the country, and take part in some engaging activities.

Returning to New York

- ► When your child comes home from Indy, the NCYC experience will be fresh so fresh it may be hard to put into words. Consider these or similar questions to get the discussion going.
 - What was one thing you heard that you do NOT want to forget?
 - Who was the best presenter you saw? What did (s)he say that stood out to you?
 - ▶When did you feel closest to God while in Indy?
 - ▶ What was the hardest part about going to NCYC? What challenged you?
 - ▶ How would you describe being with so many other teens who share your beliefs, values and faith?

Help your child take what they learned from NCYC and put it into action!

Keys to Youth NOT Having Family Called & NCYC Experience Ending

- ▶Stay out of the hotel rooms of fellow pilgrims of the opposite gender (this includes a brother and sister in separate rooms visiting one another)!
- ▶ Follow the CODE OF CONDUCT from NFCYM including:
 - ▶No use of alcohol, drugs or vape/cigarette products
 - ▶No possession of weapons
- ▶Always behave in a respectful manner toward all participants; no violence and no inappropriate contact is allowed (refer to the code of conduct).

Keys to Youth NOT to Having Family Called & NCYC Experience Ending

- ▶Stay in hotel room after curfew and be respectful of roommates and other hotel guests by being quiet.
- ▶ Return to hotel with parish group only after the last conference session of the day.
- ▶ Refrain from ordering pay per view and room service in hotel.
- ▶ Follow ALL NCYC Behavior Guidelines!

NCYC Behavior Guidelines

- ▶ Refrain from stopping, standing, or sitting in walkways or at the top or bottom of escalators.
- ▶ Do not make jokes or threats about weapons, bombs, or other dangerous acts.
- ▶Stay in your room if exhibiting symptoms of illness.
- ▶ Avoid saving seats for late-arriving group members.
- ▶ Make sure chairs are not used to store bags, coats, or other personal items.

NCYC Behavior Guidelines

- ▶Stay out of blocked-off seating sections.
- ▶ Refrain from standing on seats or sitting on the shoulders of another participant.
- ▶Do not crowd surf, create a mosh pit or "human chain," or other similar behavior.
- ▶Stay off a stage, including its staircase or ramp, unless a production crew member invites individual to do so.
- ▶ Refrain from throwing liquids or objects, including but not limited to clothespins, frisbees, beach balls, or balloons.
- Avoid using vuvuzelas, air horns, and laser pointers. Security may confiscate these prohibited items.

NCYC Behavior Guidelines

- ▶Wear credentials at all times while in the facilities.
- ▶ Follow the instructions of local police, security staff, and volunteers.
- ▶ Carry photographic identification—driver's license, passport, or school identification.
- ▶ Make a mental note of in-house phones, fire alarms, fire extinguishers, and exit locations.
- ► Know group leader/chaperone's name and how to contact them in an emergency.
- ▶ Keep group informed of whereabouts, especially group leader.
- ► Always travel with a buddy
- ▶ Report safety concerns and anyone without proper credentials or behaving strangely to staff or security personnel.


